## From the Headmaster

### Journeying with the Wards (part 3) – 2002-2003

The Ten Year Club, a loose alliance of those staff, parents and Governors who are currently involved with the school and have been for the past ten years or more, emerged on a Headmasterly whim three years ago. We will gather for the third successive time in late April, and I am certain it will be an evening awash with nostalgia, humour, and melancholy reflection. Gathering at this annual convention will be some of our current Year 8 parents whose children arrived in Nursery in September 2002 (and some who came on board before that), and it is wonderful to see how those tiny little people now flourish so graciously and kindly at the top of our school. One of them, whom I had better not name because he would be terribly embarrassed, used to grab me round the legs on my regular break time visits to Calvi (he barely reached my kneecaps). Today he looks me in the eye and will soon tower over his Headmaster. He grabs me rather less these days, a mutual agreement we have reached! Festooned in badges of responsibility, a chorister and much else, this young man could not be a finer ambassador for us, and a constant reminder of how much can be achieved in a ten year span.



A young, eager and clearly excellent Head of Maths called Jane Ashfold was amongst the new staff who came on board in September 2002. Given that the most exciting innovation in the previous year was the new tree seat (and I have produced a photo of new seat, young Headmaster and admiring son for you here which I have just rediscovered), the range of development which had taken place during the summer holiday was extraordinary and probably unprecedented. The dining hall had undergone a complete refurb, and a brave conversion to cafeteria feeding was about to be unleashed on the children (and a chaotic first week of making it work, if I recall). The grim and Victorian changing room complex had become a sparkling new staff common room, and what was once a communal bath believe it or not had morphed into the staff IT area; and the Old Library underwent a major face lift (on the narrowest of budgets).

I recall paying my twelve year old son to construct some of the flat pack items and wheel into place some furniture which Sue and I had fetched in a school minibus from a well-known Swedish supplier! And it's still all there today. All this a few days before Tim set off for his first term as a boarder at Cranleigh. I remember that night well, and what it felt like. Elsewhere DK found himself in a brand new office for the first time, and so did Peter Breakwell, having moved into a new role as Senior Master, and Steve McManus was now as our first dedicated Director of Studies. The feeling of newness and energy accompanied the smell of fresh paint which lingered in every corner of the school.



But if our adrenalin levels need any more lifting, then the spectre of the school's first major inspection at the beginning of October did the rest. It was, I remember, a horrendous month of generating policies and schemes of work to satisfy the gaze of the inspectors, and endless lectures to the pupils to ensure they were on top form during that stressful week. In the end, the week went well. Inspection was lighter touch in those days, and we enjoyed the company of Gordon Mackay, the lead inspector and his team. There were some moments of comedy – the evening I responded to my door bell at Leighton House to find the entire inspection team in a semi-circle singing happy birthday to this Headmaster; the afternoon an HMI arrived unannounced to inspect the inspectors; and hours later bumping into the inspection team behind the sports hall, hiding from the HMI! That made me feel a lot better. By the end of the week they told us they liked what they had seen, loved the ethos, but there was work to be done, and we knew it. The teaching need to be cranked up, we should emphasise subject leadership from Year 8 to the youngest area of the school in Calvi; there weren't enough loos (we knew that then!); we should invest in professional and dedicated SEN provision; we might consider rebalancing our curriculum; and our ICT need an overhaul. It was good to have these targets to aim at, and needless to say we soon set about addressing these issues, and many of them we now see as the bedrock of the school today.

The Autumn Term of 2002 was busier than ever. A senior school Head rode his motorbike into the middle of the school (literally) to support his exciting assembly talk; Reception went pumpkin picking; the Junior Department enjoyed 'Go Down Under Day'; the senior girls went on another netball tour (shopping trip!) to Jersey; and the school, this Headmaster and a Year 8 boy, featured in a short BBC news story about flexi boarding (after which the phone didn't stop ringing with interest in the school). The Year 8 parent teacher meeting took place in the LC – in

those days it was a year group of just thirty pupils, and the class size lower down the school was rarely more than twelve. Open Morning took on a new and snazzier feel of the sort we present today; fireworks were very secondary to a giant bonfire by the cricket nets in November; subject presentation evenings in Maths and English indicated a new zeal to drive things forward. My diary reminds me that we hosted several occasions to gauge parental interest in introducing girls boarding at Feltonfleet at some stage; the new Estates Committee was moving ahead with plans for a new classroom centre on the site of the pre-fabs; and grandparents descended upon us for the first time to enjoy the Christmas festivities (and what an institution that has now become).

2003 was memorable in so many ways because it marked the Centenary of the School. One hundred years earlier a small school had opened on the south coast at Folkestone. You may recall that the school re-situated in Cobham at the height of the First World War to avoid incoming fire from German battleships. We didn't meet too many former pupils from that early era at the various events which Sue and I hosted that year, but we did welcome many who had been war-time evacuees at Feltonfleet in 1939. The year was littered with exciting events to mark this milestone, including a lecture programme. A famous golfer enthralled a huge audience in the sports hall, but the crowning moment came with the final question from a small boy who summoned the courage to ask this mighty sportsman if he reckoned he could beat him and all his friends at crazy golf! It brought the house down. Another of the lecturers told an enthralling tale of cycling across Russia. I seem to recall this epic feat was marked by endless punctures (a deflating experience, we all commented afterwards).

The U-13 girls played hockey against Danes Hill for the first time that Spring, and we said never again after a Year 7 and 8 Valentine's Day disco! Wooing and hosting visiting feeder school heads from all over the region were a feature, and they still are. Tony Little, the new Headmaster of Eton, was a distinguished visitor to Evensong. And at a Feltonfleet Auction of Promises I generously offered, unwisely as it transpired, to cook a bbq at our home in France for a Feltonfleet family. I never imagined anyone would bid for it, but someone did, and that Summer the family duly appeared, ate the bbq, and stayed another five days. That bit wasn't part of the deal! And I am reminded that we spent several evenings briefing parents on our work to re-balance the curriculum and reshape the school day and week. The changes which this wrought began in September and are the basic framework of the school programme today, with the introduction of curriculum drama and music, and much else besides.

The summer term of 2003 was very much the time of the Centenary celebrations. The school community threw themselves into a sponsored walk around Painshill Park; some of us kept going and slept well that night. The Centenary Ball in the sports centre was the first of its kind there, and simply spectacular. A 'Whacky Hair and Funny Feet Day' raised our charity profile. A former pupils' service of celebration followed by lunch in a marquee brought many old boys back into the school, an event which added greatly to the Centenary year. They presented the school with four benches, each with a Section name on it and which are on the wide path in the main school.

Behind the scenes, the staff were deep into detailed school and subject development planning for the first time, a culture which is fully embedded in the workings of our school today. And we inched closer towards a commitment to providing boarding for girls in the school.

Fascinating times, and nearly ten years ago. I dare say that at the 10 Year Club Dinner next term we will share a number of anecdotes which many of us have forgotten, together with a handful that probably shouldn't resurface in this weekly blog!
